



BAQTĪĀRĪ XI. NAŞĪR KHAN ŞĀREM-AL-MOLK

Naşir Khan Şārem-al-Molk, then **Sardār-e Jang** (1864-1932), Baqtīārī chief, fifth son of Emāmqolī Khan, known as Ḥājī Īlkānī. As a commander of the cavalry regiment stationed in Tehran at the outbreak of the Constitutional revolution, he was one of the few Baqtīārī chiefs who remained favorable to the Qajars. He was *īlkānī* during World War I. In the eyes of the Baqtīārīs, he remains a legendary figure as a fierce warrior of indomitable courage.
