



JOMUR

JOMUR (also angl. Jumur), a small Sunnite Kurdish tribe of northern Lorestān. In all likelihood, it is related to the Jumur tribe of the Kānaqin area, which Cecil John Edmonds (1889-1979) identified as a branch of the Jubur tribal confederacy of Zummar, north of Mosul (p. 274, n. 2). According to Hyacinth Louis Rabino (1877-1950), in 1905 the Jumur comprised some 1,200 families and owned no land (p. 23). They spent winters in the territory of the *wāli* of the Pošt-e Kuh and summers in the districts of Asadābād and Kolyā' i, as well as in Hamadān province. According to Ḥosayn 'Ali Razmārā, they comprised some 1,000 households in 1942 (p. 23). In the 1980s, Iraj Afšār-Sistāni, citing the name as "Jamir," located them in the Hamadan region (I, p. 218) and described them as Shi'ites. He also related that they were divided into two sections, 'Abdali and Barāzi, and that they were employed in animal husbandry (*dām-dāri*, q.v.).

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
